#### INTERIM PASTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

2007 was an interesting event filled year!

We look back and see some remarkable events. First and foremost, we celebrated our 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary! The old house was demolished and the original part of the church was painted. We began a mission study process which was designed to analyze the realities of our current situation as a congregation, to analyze the community in which we minister, and to suggest a ministry plan for the future, all for the purpose of determining the characteristics of the minister who would be most effective in this congregation. Bright Start Pre-school and Childhood Center experienced increased enrollment. We have a confirmation class for the first time in several years. We have a dynamic youth group. Barbara Kramer continues to be very effective in organizing and running the church office ably assisted by the office angels. The church auction and Christmas fair raised substantial money for missions. We continue to provide benefit for and receive benefit from the Sudanese Presbyterian Fellowship in Portland. Many members give an incredible number of hours to church affairs. Good things continue to happen!

However, we still must face some serious issues. Our membership is down from 209 in 2004 to 165 today resulting in the loss of energy and a financial shortfall in the operating budget and in building fund receipts. For the second year in a row the church picnic was cancelled for lack of interest. We still must deal with deferred maintenance issues.

We are in transition and evolving into a congregation which will be intentional in calling a pastor based on a realistic congregational identity and understanding of the specific skills required by a minister to be effective and successful at MCPC. In this transition we have made some progress on the five interim tasks but there is still work to do before being ready to call a pastor. The Mission Study Committee worked long and hard to produce a report which (1) now goes to the Session for approval before (2) submission to the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry which must approve the mission study before (3) MCPC can form a Pastor Nominating Committee to seek out the pastor God has already chosen for us.

All transitions are painful for some and MCPC is no different. We have experienced declining membership since 2004 and the retirement of a pastor. For several years we have had to deal with unhealthy dissension, conflict, hostility, and animosity. Now we are trying to deal constructively with the past and move toward a new identity where we are on the same page in our understanding of what God is calling us to be and to do. Part of our evolution involves leadership changes and the transition from a committee structure suitable for a larger church to a structure reflecting the realities of our current situation. Our evolution also includes a changed decision-making process from hierarchical to collegial.

There is every reason to be optimistic if we are faithful and obedient as we trust in God's promises and rebuild, revitalize, and reinvent this community of faith to the glory of God.

2007 began with an Epiphany Party! The event was held on January 6 from four until six in Fellowship Hall. Crafts, a scavenger hunt, singing and the story of the Fourth Wise Man read by Debbie Patterson were enjoyed along with a finger-food pot luck supper and a white birthday cake with candles for Jesus. Kristen Hoffbuhr, Elise Horsfall, Vida Mitchell and Peggy Killmer planned the event.

Vida Mitchell led a Lent/Easter "banners of joy" project while Laura Labbe oversaw the children's "procession of the palms" on Palm Sunday. The Church School again participated in One Great Hour of Sharing.

Church school was based on the Bible-Quest multi-age curriculum. A total of thirty-five children were taught by fifteen volunteers who taught on a rotating basis. In the spring there were three classes: older elementary, younger elementary, and K-pre K. Due to a change in demographics in the fall, the class was organized as one multiage group with two or more teachers. The Heifer Project was the theme for church school during advent. In the spring, the seventh and eighth graders continued working with the PCUSA church history curriculum. This fall there is a confirmation class with eight students, eighth grade and older, taught by Audrey Grassman and Rev. Sanner.

The youth group with advisors Roy Defio and Sheri Nadell met at least monthly. Youth led worship on Mother's Day. A rafting trip at the end of summer was a huge success. Two youth, Josh Grassman and Ben Nadell, attended the PCUSA Youth Triennium as did Audrey Grassman.

Bible Book and Brown Bag is being led by Rev. Sanner. The group is studying the book of Revelation.

Hearty thanks to all those who were able to help. Session has voted to discontinue bean suppers, an idea supported by CLC.

The Church picnic normally held in August was canceled. CLC attempted to have a lobster bake held at Church. When the cost per person seemed prohibitive, a bbq was suggested. Low numbers of people signing up for the bbq required the committee to cancel the picnic.

The 20th Anniversary Celebration kept CLC busy preparing a very special coffee hour in October. Thanks to Barbara Schafter and her committee for overseeing the event.

The "Free Spirits", a group of those over 50, gather every three months for a meal and fellowship. This year the group has been meeting at Bookland.

## MISSION COMMITTEE 2007 ANNUAL REPORT

The Mission Committee is responsible for championing mission awareness, involvement and financial giving at MCPC. It is also responsible for allocating the mission funds of MCPC within the operating church budget.

MCPC contributed \$11,549 of operating expense funds for mission in 2007. The largest contribution (\$6,300) went to the Unified Mission of the Presbyterian Church (USA) that supports General Assembly, Synod and Presbytery programs and projects. The remaining money was donated to organizations and causes such as the local Habitat for Humanity chapter, our South Africa church partnerships, the Maine Council of Churches, the Sudanese Presbyterian Fellowship of Portland, Intervarsity Fellowship and our PNNE Camp Wilmot.

A total of \$6,039 was also was sent to the PC(USA) thanks to contributions to four National Special Offerings (One Great Hour of Sharing, Christmas Joy Offering, Pentecost Offering, and Peacemaking Offering).

An additional \$12,711 in direct mission dollars flowed out of MCPC in 2007 thanks primarily to the efforts of the Presbyterian Women (\$5,793), Deacons (\$1,285), the Public Supper crew (\$394), Habitat for Humanity walkers (\$1,785), Time and Talent bidders (\$552), and Christmas Market Heifer Project International, CEOLI Card, Habitat for Humanity and fair trade coffee shoppers (\$1,514). Total mission giving of \$30,299 represents a 16% level which compares with 16% in 2005 and 15% in 2006 (see Percentage Giving Table for more details).

Much went on in 2007 related to mission outreach besides financial support. The Mid-Coast Hunger Prevention Program was supported through food deliveries and "manning" the kitchen. Amnesty International continued to be championed. A trip took place to Slidell, LA to work on Hurricane Katrina disaster recovery. And very importantly, the Mission Committee was an advocate for three local outreach efforts: our own Bright Start Preschool and Child Care Center, the Sudanese Presbyterian Fellowship of Portland and Habitat for Humanity Chapter — 7 Rivers Maine (see separate reports for each of the three).

The partnership between MCPC and three Presbyterian churches in Adelaide, South Africa continues. Highlights were shared with the congregation through the Mission Bulletin Board and the Mid-Coast Monthly newsletter. Thanks to a Presbytery of Northern New England sponsored pastor's exchange with South Africa, Rev. Ed Cowie from the Ft. Beaufort Presbyterian Church, Amatola Presbytery, spent two weeks at MCPC sharing, learning, preaching, teaching and enjoying our hospitality. Monetary contributions were made to support the AIDS/HIV outpatient facility at the Adelaide Hospital.

A new educational effort was undertaken in 2007. Mission Yearbooks (PCUSA) were distributed to the MCPC congregation to help raise the awareness of the many mission-related activities and projects that are going on in the USA and abroad. The project will continue in 2008.

#### Bright Start at Mid-Coast Presbyterian Church Annual Report – 2007

Bright Start at Mid-Coast Presbyterian Church is a mission program that provides child care services and early childhood educational programs to children in the Topsham-Brunswick community. Bright Start offers full-time child care for children ages 2 ½ through 6 and has offered before and after school care with a full-time summer program for youngsters in elementary school grades K through five. The school age program was discontinued at the end of the 2006-07 school year because of low enrollment and the number of other options now available for school age children, including before and after school care at the local elementary schools. Bright Start also offers a morning preschool and an afternoon pre-K module. The morning preschool can be accessed as a stand-alone unit by families not requiring child care.

At the end of 2007 there were 26 preschool children attending programs at Bright Start. Scholarship aid has been given to 9 children during 2007 totaling \$12,419. Eight children have received assistance from outside agencies such as the state voucher program, assistance for parents in school and Child Development Services who refers children to Bright Start for developmental therapy. This financial aid amounted to \$29,878. In addition CDS paid Bright Start \$13,352 as reimbursement for the 1:1 Aide we provided for one of these children.

Bright Start completed its seventh full year as a program of the church in August of 2007. The child care program enjoys an excellent reputation in the community. The staff of Bright Start strives for excellence in the quality of services and programming offered, regularly attending classes and workshops to further their training.

The staff is comprised of 4 full-time teachers, one part-time assistant teacher, a 1/2 time director, a ½ time administrative assistant, 2 regular volunteers from the MCPC congregation, and 2 volunteers from the community. Volunteers provide much-needed support to Bright Start by assisting teachers with student supervision, mentoring, snack preparation, reading to and with youngsters, or simply sharing a hug. Bright Start eagerly seeks more volunteer support from the congregation and the community.

The Board and Staff gratefully acknowledge the support of the Mission Committee and the Presbyterian Women and individual contributions for other special needs. Designated gifts from individual members of the congregation as well as donations of snacks and other goods are always welcome. Because of allergies, we became a "peanut free" school in 2006.

Bright Start children exchange visits with The Highlands residents and also visit Sky Hy Adult Day Care to interact with the clients there. Other enriching field trips have been taken to the Maine State Aquarium, Maine State Music Theater, Topsham Public Library and Portland Symphony Orchestra Kinder Konzerts. Through the Salvation Army, Bright Start adopted a family for Christmas providing the mother and two children with clothing, toys, and gift certificates to purchase a special dinner. There were two well-attended "potluck" dinners in 2007 for Board, Staff, Volunteers, and Bright Start families and after these gifts of food were taken to the Tedford Shelter.

At the end of the year Bright Start purchased new vertical blinds for the west side of the education wing and the West Room.

The Bright Start Advisory Board is comprised of Laura Dorrer, Dominique Sommer, Lori Quimby, Shirley Reese and Debbie Patterson, Chair. Joanne Hardy is the Director.

## HABITAT FOR HUMANITY- 7 RIVERS MAINE CHAPTER Annual Report 2007

Mid-Coast Presbyterian Church continued its support for the local Habitat Chapter as a Covenant Community Church for the 17<sup>th</sup> consecutive year. In 2007, MCPC supported the construction, in Brunswick, of the local Chapter's first handicapped accessible home with a pledge of \$20,000. Construction began in April and the house was dedicated to Diane and Earle Black on September 23<sup>rd</sup>. Under the able coordination of Marge Jackson, MCPC members participated on the regularly scheduled MCPC building dates on the home during its construction. Many church members are active in HFH/7RM as volunteers, committee and Board of Directors members.

In February, HFH/7RM opened a ReStore retail sales facility at 108 Centre Street in Bath. Many Habitat chapters in the United States have ReStore operations. HFH/7RM's is the second in Maine. The store sells new and lightly used building materials, appliances and home furnishings, which are donated to it, at prices that are much below prevailing retail prices. Several members of MCPC helped to refurbish the 108 Centre Street building for use as HFH/7RM's new office and ReStore facility. All revenues from the ReStore operation are used to support Habitat's mission of providing decent affordable housing for working families.

14 walkers from MCPC participated in HFH/7RM's Annual Spring Walk raising \$1,785.

#### SUDANESE PRESBYTERIAN FELLOWSHIP OF PORTLAND 2007 ANNUAL REPORT

The sponsoring of the Sudanese Presbyterian Fellowship of Portland by Mid-Coast Presbyterian Church continues to bring joy, growth and new friendships! Eighteen families and individuals that have fled the Sudan formed a Fellowship under the Presbytery of Northern New England (PNNE) in 2004. The Years 2005 - 2007 have seen an outpouring of support within our Presbytery led by Mid-Coast Presbyterian and a spiritual growth and cultural maturing within the Fellowship. Four new members joined in 2007.

A group from Mid-Coast Church goes down to Portland one Sunday afternoon a month to participate in a joint worship and communion service. Following training, the Sudanese are now providing communion assistance to the officiating PNNE pastor (often our own Dick Sanner, Rich Killmer, Ted Campbell and James Underwood). Winter clothing, Christmas gift cards, computers, furniture, books and appliances continue to be graciously donated by MCPC members. Another important aspect of our partnership with the Sudanese is involving them in the life of MCPC. To that objective, we hosted the Fellowship at our special birthday worship service in October and at other Sunday services.

A key step in expanding the financial support of the Fellowship took place in 2007 with the awarding of a joint PC(USA)/Synod/Presbytery grant for 2007 – 2009 to MCPC to enable the Fellowship to move forward to a new plateau. Rent of dedicated space and salary for the lay leader will come from this grant (see the table below for the 2007 grant financial statement).

Support is also coming from other churches in the Presbytery. Eric Markman of the First Presbyterian Church of Nashua, NH, Rob John of the First Presbyterian Church - Old South Church Meeting House in Newburyport, MA (a former relief worker in the Sudan), Ann Marie Simon of the Union Presbyterian Church in North Turner, ME and Isaias Rivera of the Tabernaculo de Adoracion y Musica congregation in Lawrence, MA have all guest preached. The Sudanese have traveled to churches for joint worship services. The Sudanese Fellowship has also been involved in Presbytery activities. They participate in Presbytery meetings and in New Church Development Committee of our Presbytery where all immigrant fellowship and churches in PNNE come together for support and for the exchange of ideas.

Much has been done to help the Sudanese Fellowship. So much more could be accomplished. Education is a key priority. Employment, transportation and language skill improvement continue to also be major needs. Prayers are also being raised for support of families still in the Sudan or Ethiopia, Egyptian and Kenyan refugee camps and for Fellowship families that lost loved ones to the fighting in 2007. All at Mid-Coast are welcome to come on down to Portland to help broaden and deepen our ties with these great folks from the Sudan!

2007 was an exceptionally busy and productive year for our committee. We began our year by exploring the costs of removing the old church house. After review of several bids, Mainely Builders, LLC of Topsham was chosen as having presented the most comprehensive and cost effective bid. The project was completed, including removal of a large spruce tree near our front sign, in late April and early May.

A dumpster was installed at the end of the small driveway leading to Maine St and a stockade fence was placed around it. This eliminated the need for the trash cans being at the front entrance of the church on pick-up days.

The urgent need for repainting our church house was addressed and bids solicited. Stanley Weaver was selected The job was completed in August, resulting in a vast improvement in the appearance of our church.

The annual mowing of our grounds was again done by Groundcovers. The necessary exterior cleanup of driveways and grounds and trimming of our plantings was done by a volunteer group of twelve from our membership.

Norma Carroll organized the annual yard sale. This sale is vital to the routine costs of our maintenance of church and grounds.

The Can-Do-Crew has been constantly busy with such projects as roof repair, replacing outside trim as necessary prior to the painting, installing shelving where needed - in addition to such mundane projects as clogged plumbing, repairing water-damaged walls in Foulger Gallery, and polishing the brass handles in Foulger Gallery. Bud Cherry reports the need for volunteers to join this very important subcommittee.

In preparation for our 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary, Russ Riendeau & Clee Miller planted a pin oak tree in the now extensive lawn on the Main St. Side of church. The Can-Do-Crew reset and painted the entrance step at the door leading into the church.

In addition to the notable projects reviewed in this report, every month brings a sizeable list of concerns and responsibilities for this committee - monitoring the heating system, assuring that paper supplies are available, making sure snow plowing & sanding is adequate, scheduling requests for building use, minor repairs where needed, fielding requests (and complaints) as they come up - all done with dedication to the maintenance of the Lord's house!!

#### TREASURER'S ANNUAL REPORT for the YEAR 2007

2007 was an exceptional year in which the strong financial reserves of the church allowed the expenditure of \$32,235 to remove the house in front of the church that had become a hazard, and paint the exterior of the building. Designated gifts of \$4,105 were contributed to these projects, with the balance covered by reserve funds.

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We also were able to absorb a loss of \$22,975 in the Operating Fund with carryover funds from prior years.

Our cash balance was reduced \$53,334 over the year. The cash balance at the start of 2008 is \$134,857. This includes \$80,954 designated for specific uses. The Building Fund reserve is \$27,798. The MCPC Trust has \$12,262. The remaining \$13,843 is the unrestricted operating cash balance.

<u>Operating Fund</u> — Operating Income of \$143,607 was short of budget by \$8,818. The shortfall would have been significantly greater without the donation of \$4,221 from the Bean Supper and Auction proceeds, and a donation of \$2,000 from Bright Start.

Expenses of \$166,582 were \$10,958 less than budgeted. The net loss of \$22,975 was \$2,140 better than the budgeted loss for the year.

<u>Building Fund</u> – Loan payments for the building have exceeded income for the past two years. The shortfall was \$12,800 for 2007. Much of this is due to membership turnover since the pledges were made in late 2005. Current Building Fund pledges for 2008 will total an estimated \$35,500, approximately \$11,000 less than loan payments due.

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National Offerings - \$4,847 was contributed in support of the traditional One Great Hour of Sharing, Christmas Joy, Pentecost and Peacemaking annual offerings. Sales for the Heifer Project during the 2007 Christmas season raised an additional \$1,185 for international mission.

<u>Habitat for Humanity Fund</u> – We paid our \$20,000 pledge toward construction of the Black home in Brunswick from funds collected in prior years.

<u>2008 Budget</u> – The 2008 budget has not been completed in time for publication. Copies of the budget will be distributed at the annual meeting.
