Affirmation of Forgiveness *God's light shone as John the Baptism testified to what he saw: Jesus, the long-awaited, coming one! God's light shines in the world and all our human failings cannot overcome it!*

*Friends, believe the Good News of the Gospel: **All: In Jesus Christ, we are forgiven!***

Holy Ghost, Dispel Our Sadness

The Church’s Witness: The history of the church includes both courage and daring, growth and innovation. However, we often fail to see the risks of Christians who witnessed to their faith. Today, we remember a few who, by death witnessed to Christ’s way in the world. We remember an early Presbyterian Pastor Elijah Lovejoy murdered at age 34 in 1837 for his words and deeds:

“Emancipation – what is meant by it? Simply that the slaves shall cease to be held as property and shall henceforth be held and treated as human beings. Simply that we should take our feet from off their necks.”

Today, we remember Dr. Martin Luther King who when 39 died by violence; we remember his words:

“I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.”

Today, we remember the Maryknoll Sisters Ita Ford and Maura Clarke, Ursuline Sister Dorothy Kazel and Lay Missioner Jean Donovan — who were abducted, abused and murdered in El Salvador in 1980 for standing alongside the Salvadoran people. Concerning her witness Jean Donovan, at age 27, wrote:

“The Peace Corps left today. Several times I have decided to leave El Salvador. I almost could, except for the children, the poor, bruised victims of this insanity. Who would care for them? Whose heart could be so staunch as to favor the reasonable thing in a sea of their tears and helplessness? Not mine, dear friend, not mine.”

Today, we remember these witnesses of Jesus’ teaching that God does not change the world through violence but through love that refuses to abandon the work of acceptance, justice and compassion. And we add the name of a Presbyterian sister in formation and faith, 37 year old Renee Nicole Good, whose last words were:

“I’m not mad at you.” Remembering these witnesses we renew our commitment to shine Christ’s light and be Christ’s love in our community and world. Amen.
